

It is illegal to smoke in a car carrying anyone under the age of 18.

You must do several things before you drive a car or ride a motorcycle. These include getting a driving licence, registering your vehicle and making sure it's insured, paying vehicle tax and getting an MOT.

You must not drive faster than the speed limit for the type of road and your type of vehicle. The speed limit is the absolute maximum - it doesn't mean it's safe to drive at this speed in all conditions.

It's illegal to use your phone while driving or riding a motorcycle unless you have hands-free access, such as a bluetooth headset, voice command, or a dashboard holder.

Some forms of bullying are illegal and should be reported to the police. These include: violence or assault, theft, repeated harassment or intimidation, for example name-calling, threats and abusive phone calls, emails or text messages and hate crimes.

Children must get an education between the school term after their fifth birthday and the last Friday in June in the school year they turn 16.

Parents can be held responsible if their child repeatedly gets into trouble or if they don't take reasonable steps to control their child's behaviour.

Children between the ages of 10 and 17 can be arrested and taken to court if they commit a crime. They are treated differently from adults and are dealt with by youth courts, given different sentences and sent to special secure centres for young people rather than to adult prisons.
